


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
Attainment on the up at SHS!

The government uses a data set called Insight which compares the attainment of each student in a school to peers with a similar profile across the country. Our students have outperformed their peers in Literacy and Numeracy in S4 and S5 for the second year running!

- Our curriculum needs to be inclusive and not simply designed to support academic pathways

- Many new courses are more vocational in character and do not include examinations as part of the assessment.
- This has all been achieved by creative timetabling and staff commitment- the traditional academic offer remains and is boosted by partnerships with other schools and Borders College.



Our new Digital Hub is now up and running for Coding, App development and Esports.

This will also be used by S6 WeNetwork interns as they start their work experience for an international recruitment consultancy based in Singapore! Amazing!

Ready To Learn Checklist

Every school day begins with RTL (Ready To Learn). Key safety messages are discussed and support is provided to students who are unsure about the day ahead. This really helps prepare students for a successful day.

Lesson after lesson and day after day- for all the years of school - the little things add up to make a very significant difference to the achievements of our young people.

Please have a look at the checklist below and help us to ensure every student is Ready To Learn.

Healthy Start	The link between performance and a healthy start is really clear and thank you for supporting this. Breakfast club is available at the school every day.	<
Uniform	Pupils who wear the full school uniform contribute enormously to the purposeful atmosphere, high standards and high expectations at the school as well as a sense of equality amongst our students.	
	Students are expected to arrive at school in full school uniform every day- and to bring PE Kit in a bag.	✓
	We thank you for supporting this. Please see below for information about the support available and/or how to access Clothing Allowance.	
lpad	The ipad is now the 'school bag' of students at SHS- it's vital that students look after their ipads responsibly and bring their fully charged ipad to school each day.	<
Mobile Phones	It is very clear to us that students who carry their phones about or have them in pockets during class are continually aware of them and easily and often distracted from their learning. Inads mean that phones no longer have any role in class.	
	More than ever, students (and everyone else!) are finding it difficult to separate themselves from their phones. In addition to the impact on learning, we are aware of significantly negative impact of social media on mental health.	~
	To encourage a more balanced relationship with phones, we therefore require S1/2/3 students to keep their phones at home. If senior students bring them to school, they must be in bags and out of sight during class time.	
Lunchtimes	The performance of students in the afternoon who have a high sugar lunch appears to be very significantly less effective than students who make healthy choices. If you are not confident your child is making healthy choices in the town, please consider a packed lunch or our canteen. We do not allow energy drinks or sugary drinks in school.	~
