Our 13 budding young chefs were challenged to prepare a healthy two-course meal and present it to the judges in two

hours.

Prior to the day students attended planning meetings where they researched and amended recipes, costed their ingredients, planned their garnishes and table setting and designed their menu.

With only 120 minutes on the clock, students had to balance speed with precision, carefully planning each step to ensure both courses were completed to a high standard.

From knife work to seasoning, plating, and timing, competitors displayed advanced culinary techniques that highlighted their knife skills, heat control and dexterity.

The atmosphere was intense yet inspiring, as students pushed themselves to the limit, showing resilience and focus under pressure.

The final dishes were not only delicious but beautifully presented, reflecting the effort and creativity invested. Judges praised the students for their professionalism in the kitchen and the high quality of their meals.

Holly Craig in S2 won first place with 57 points out of 60 with a decadent smoked salmon risotto and tangy lemon cheese cake, closely followed by Rowan McGurk in S3 with 56 points who

served an inspiring pan-fried salmon and seaweed salad and chocolate lava cake.

The competition was a celebration of skill, discipline, and passion for cooking, proving that with hard work, planning and creativity, even with a tight deadline, can produce outstanding results.
